

Bernard Makoare, Chair IWI: Ngāti Whatua, Te Rarawa, Ngāpuhi-nui-tonu HAPŪ: Te Uri o Hau, Te Waiariki, Te Kai Tutae

Bernard is a practising artist, designer and carver with over 30 years of exhibiting as both a solo artist and collaborator on a range of enterprises and public art and sculpture projects. He is personally committed to cultural and tribal revitalisation and has spent many years actively working on this for Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Whatua, Ngāpuhi, Te Rarawa and other iwi organisations.



Moe Milne (ONZM), Deputy Chair IWI: Ngāpuhi HAPU: Ngāti Hine

Moe is a highly qualified and skilled practitioner across the health, education and social services sectors. She is a trained nurse, teacher, has worked in management and has been a Trustee of such organisations such as Foundation North, Te Reo o Ngāti Hine, Te Hau Ora o Te Taitokerau and Te Ara o Te Whakaaro Pai. Moe is a recognised Te Reo Māori expert and her contributions to mātauranga Ngāpuhi are highly valued on the board and across ngā rohe.





Kura Te Waru Rewiri , Director IWI: Ngāti Kahu, Ngāpuhi, Ngāti Raukawa HAPŪ: Ngāti Pakahi, Ngātirangi, Ngāti Kauwhata

Kura is a contemporary Māori artist, art educator and academic. She has exhibited widely and her paintings, which often explore mana wāhine, are represented in numerous public and private exhibitions both within New Zealand and around the world. Currently, Kura is the Associate Professor of Māori Visual Arts at Massey University. She was previously a member of Te Waka Toi and in 2019 she received the Te Tohu o Te Papa Rongomaraeroa Award for excellence and outstanding contribution to Ngā Toi Māori.





Rau Hoskins, Director IWI: Ngāpuhi HAPŪ: Ngāti Hau, Ngāti Hao, Ngāti Rahiri, Ngāi Tawake

Rau is a Director of designTribe Architects which specialises in the field of Māori architecture, particularly within cultural/marae, visitor, health, urban, educational and papakāinga environments. Rau has a particular interest in connecting built space, place and Ngāpuhi, encouraging Ngāpuhi artists to see built environments as their canvasses and connecting Ngāpuhi artists with commissioned opportunities in public and privately built spaces in Te Taitokerau.





Dorothy Waetford, Director IWI: Ngāpuhi-nui-tonu HAPŪ: Ngātiwai, Ngāti Hine

Dorothy is an uku/clay artist who has exhibited and toured New Zealand and internationally as a solo artist and as part of collectives. Dorothy worked as a dancer in the 1980s and also worked with Playback Community Theatre.

She is a member of the Ngā Kaihanga Uku Māori Artists Collective, Te Taitokerau Māori Arts Collective and also a member of Te Ātinga Contemporary Visual Arts sub-committee of Toi Māori Aotearoa.





WĀNANGA KŌRERO

- Te Pū, Te More, Te Aka, Te Rea a karakia proposition for the beginning of our Māori creation, using the analogy of the growth of a plant as imagery for the pure creative process
- Ngā kete o te Wānanga a framework for the way in which we work together and collectively breathe life into the regeneration of taonga tuku iho and the reinvigoration of taonga creation moving forward
- Wānanga, a process The Wānanga Toi as a space to enable the creation of new knowledge. What are the practises we do now, individually and collectively, that are specific to us in Te Taitokerau/Ngāpuhi-nui-tonu
- He aha ngā momo toi? How do we identify the different artforms and articulate their unique āhuatanga
- Ngā taumata identifying a collective understanding and description of the levels of achievement for ringatoi throughout their creative journey

We have set up four physical studio spaces Te Whare Rēhia, Te Whare Whakairo, Te Whare Pōra, me Te Whare Toi. Each of these spaces house a variety of momo toi, to encourage interaction and potential collaboration! We invite ringatoi to discuss and contribute your whakaaro rangatira during the wānanga whakawhiti kōrero sessions, to consider the following:

Motatau te maunga Taikirau te awa Mataparua te kāinga Heeni Hoterene ahau He uri ahau no te awaawa o Motatau. Ngāti Hine te hapu, Ngāpuhi te iwi Ko ōku pānga hoki ki a Kohatu Taka o Mangataipa, ki a Ngāti Pare o Waikare Tēnā kia huihuimai tātou katoa

E noho ana ahau ki runga i tōku kāinga tūturu ko Mataparua. Pai tēnei noho, pa tata ki te Ngahere, kii katoa i ngā Puriri, i ngā tōtara i ngā manu i tioriori ana i te ata, tae noa ki te pō. E pūpuhi ana te hau makariri i te wa makariri, e wera ana i ngā rangi o te raumati. He pai ki ahau ki te noho kei waenga o tōku hapu me te whakatupu aku tamariki kia hore e mataku ki tō rātou marae, wharekai me ngā nekenekehanga o te kāinga, kua tau.

We must not under estimate our intelligence to create taonga that express our survival as Māori. What is our greatest expression? For me it is Te Reo Māori.

The understanding of our natural world gives us the skills to navigate whatever happens in life, keeping us adaptable and fluid in an ever changing world, Te Ao Hurihuri.

PAPAMAHI: Planning by the Maramataka Māori

Be prepared to develop your own maramataka based on your own environment you live it, city, town, country or sea. During this 2 hour quick fire workshop I wIII share korero on why it is important to be aware of Te Ao Māori and how best to use maramataka Māori, the Māori lunar calendar to achieve balance and productivity, just like our tūpuna!

BLING BLING TO! MARAMA

Bling Bling Toi Marama is a light festival that celebrates the rising of Puanga & Matariki. Ākonga and whānau have created glowing or illuminating light installations to be exhibited over 4 nights in Kaikohe.

This year's kaupapa mātua is within the realm of "Te Waonui a Tāne": The world that exists within and under the crown canopy of Tane Mahuta, Atua of the Forest.

Bling Bling Toi Marama celebrates the rising of Puanga & Matariki with a light festival. Tai o Hī Tai o Hā will be creating the waharoa, the entrance experience for Bling Bling Toi Marama in relation to ngā hinerei o Puanga.

Works must be capable of simple suspension installation or self-supported to be free standing.

- · 3rd May 28th June: Creating Time!
- · 28th June 6th July: Curating and installation of artworks.
- 7th July 10th July: Bling Bling Toi Marama Festival Days.

Te Waonui a Tāne:

The three realms within Tane's domain are Tane Whirikaha, Tāne Mahuta and Tāne Torokaha. Here are just a few starter points to fuel the creative ideas.

1. Tāne Whirikaha:

Describes the root systems in and above the forest floor that keeps the trees upright and draws in the wai (water) to feed the trees.

2. Tāne Mahuta:

Describes the physical nature of rākau (trees) and ngā tupu o te ngahere (plants of the forest), the upright stance and posture of the rakau can bend and move with the wind without yielding to Tāwhirimatea.

3. Tāne Torokaha:

Is the canopy of the forest created by a branch system reaching out and interlacing each other to create an infrastructure of support and shelter. Tāne Torokaha acts like a cloak sheltering all the flora and fauna keeping them all safe and secure. This branching system while sheltering all, also lets in light, rain and vital nutrients to sustain everything living underneath.

▲ ✓ Korero tuku iho and maintaining a personal connection with the whenua & wai in Hokianga is the foundation for everything I do. Whether it's art, business, whanau, hapu, or anything... it starts there for me.

> When I consider the scope that the world offers us today I feel grateful, proud, and excited to be Māori. The inherent depth of our culture gives us a unique lense through which we get to shape and define things in a way that no other culture would and then apply that to what we create, what we do, how we think, and what we see. I believe in finding our own pathways and know that enabling creative thinkers is essential for imagining new futures, new horizons, new ideas.

PAPAMAHI: Toi Pākihi

As artists it can be challenging when our creativity collides with the business world. And, as Māori we sometimes find ourselves in situations which pose questions that challenge our culture & beliefs.

Questions around pricing, placement, promotion, contracts, supplier/consignment agreements, and the process where our art is considered as a 'product' can be both difficult and easy for any artist no matter how experienced they are... And, it is a constantly recurring conversation. However, with careful consideration, reasoning, and understanding these conversations can become more comfortable & rewarding over time.

This workshop will provide a brief introduction to some core business concepts and some 'good to know' basics for anyone starting out.




Tai o hī, Tai o hā. Ka timu te tai, ka pari te tai. Ko te taiohi auaha o Te Taitokerau, kei uta!


